#### **From Co-President Tom Goodhart**

Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. (Romans 12:2)

The news of the most recent tragic deaths of young teens who took their own lives after being targets of anti-gay bullying shocks and saddens us. We mourn the loss of these young people and our prayers go out for their loved ones.

In the wake of their deaths, schools and community organizations initiated efforts to combat bullying. The *It Gets Better Project* was started, an online video channel dedicated to sharing the message with young people who are bullied because of their sexual orientation or *perceived* orientation that their lives will improve.

Civic campaigns like this are valuable. *But where is God in all this? And where is God's church?* 

Understanding God in Christ, we are convinced that God is with every young person who is bullied and abused, that God's heart breaks when God's children are so filled with despair and hopelessness that they would take their own lives. Further, we believe God mourns when the response of the church called to be "Christ's very presence and body in a lost and broken world" is to stand idly by (therefore implicitly condoning such abuse) or, at worst, joins in practicing hate and rejection.

This is why Room for All exists: "to support, educate and advocate for the full participation of lesbian, gay, bi-sexual and transgender (LGBT) persons in all aspects of the life and ministry of the Reformed Church in America as compelled by the inclusive love of God revealed to us by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (RfA mission statement).

We do this not as part of a culture war, or as adapting to societal trends, nor as being conformed by some social or political agenda. We do this because we are called by God, empowered by the Holy Spirit, and following Christ. We do this because our faith compels us. We do this because we believe it gets better, that God is making it better, and even, that God invites us to participate in making it better.



And we're not alone in this. There are many people in our pews who, perhaps in feeling the movement of the Holy Spirit, sense that the church has been too quiet in advocating for all God's children. They are saddened by the results of a religion that is too often complicit in the bullying. Persons like these in congregations across our denomination are lifting their voices, asking the hard questions, and seeking to discern what is the will of God as their churches are being transformed.

Room for All invites you to join in that movement of getting better, of making room for all. What that means for you may look different depending on your particular congregation and locale. Maybe it means officially, publicly, becoming a congregation that truly welcomes all. Maybe it means merely starting the conversation, a small group or Bible study, or even something as simple and profound as sharing your story with someone at coffee fellowship. Whatever the next step is for you, Room for

we moved forward. Counseled by our mentors, we were convinced in our hearts that if our movement is to grow and our mission accomplished, we needed to take this next step.



for All to respond immediately to the spate of suicides by LGBT youth, she has spearheaded communications with our RCA colleges and seminaries around issues of bullying and of community safety. She has begun making presentations to regional synods, classes, and churches. She is hard at work coordinating our plans for two training events this spring, one in the Holland/Grand Rapids area and one in the Albany/ Schenectady area. She has launched this newsletter!

I can't begin to tell you (maybe I don't need to) the difference it makes having someone devote full time to choreographing all that we can accomplish together. God has blessed the work of Room for All over these past five years in unimaginable ways; and now God has blessed us with Marilyn. It remains for us to trust God for the funding needed to build on this momentum.

# More Than Ready



Room for All supporters in the "Holland is Ready" and "Hope is Ready" groups have been involved in an exciting project in Holland, MI this fall. The Holland classis (RCA) initiated an overture to the city's Human Relations Commission to press for a clause in a city ordinance barring discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. Supporters gathered in Holland's Centennial Park to show the city their approval of the ordinance. Many attended and spoke at the subsequent meeting of the Commission, which passed the ordinance unanimously. The measure now goes to the Holland City Council for a vote.

RfA's Karis Granberg-Michaelson describes her feelings at the experience: "When I think about the recent Hope is Ready/ Holland is Ready GR Press photo opportunity where over 300 people gathered on a Saturday morning to send a pro-

Kim Reohr (First, Albany) commented on the visible joy and public affection in the event, while First, Schenectady's Gay Doolittle recalls, "I was a little apprehensive. We were told there would be hecklers, and there were. But supporters, cheering us on, far outnumbered them. Everyone was welcom-

ing and joyful at the opportunity to support a cause in which we all believe."

Miranda Rand posted the pictures of the RfA participants on her Facebook page. "I got lots of thumbs up," she remembers,

"especially from the youth group of the church where I work" (Lynnwood, Schenectady).

First, Albany's Hennie Kohut summed it up: "The Gay Pride parade gave me Church Pride."

> These stories aren't unique to the RCA, of course, but this denomination has been my context all my life, and so I hear them differently. Personally. Loyalty carries the potential for both pride *and* pain.

But the good news is that not all the stories are painful. I'm proud to tell you that some are stories of hope. Those of us who attended the "Making Room for All" conference in Grand Rapids last year certainly absorbed harsh testimonies. But we also heard about RCA pastors and parishioners who nurture welcoming and affirming congregations in which all may worship and serve openly, including the LGBT sisters and brothers in their midst. Such churches have been intentional about fostering loving and respectful dialogue surrounding LGBT inclusion, so that all voices are heard, all questions welcomed.

That, it seems to me, represents the RCA at its best. It is the work to which Room for All is committed, and which I am now privileged to facilitate as coordinator. I give thanks for this opportunity, and welcome your prayers, your suggestions, and your stories.

# "I Wish Your Wish"

At the church of Nosso Senhor do Bonfim in Salvador, Bahia, Brazil, the faithful tie silk ribbons to their wrists and to the gates of the church, and, according to tradition, their wishes are granted when the ribbons wear away and fall off. For Rivane Neuenschwander's September installation, *I Wish Your Wish*, at Manhattan's New Museum of Contempo-

rary Art, hundreds of ribbons were printed with wishes submitted by previous visitors and hung from the gallery walls. Arriving visitors were invited to remove a ribbon, tie it to their wrist, and replace it with a new wish written on slip of paper, continuing the project that keeps generating new ribbons and dreams.

This is the ribbon that I removed when I visited the exhibit an hour before what would be my first Room for All board meeting, and which has now fallen from my wrist.

I pray for that son, and for that conversation in every family waiting to have it.

# MEMBER TO MEMBER: Personal Stories "Celebrating for Diversity" by Robert David Sweeney

As I contemplated the approach of my fortieth birthday this past summer, I was torn between throwing a big celebration or not drawing any attention to this major milestone — after all, I don't look 40 and most of the time I try not to act older than 14!

But struck by the idea that this birthday could be used to serve God, I decided to invite a diverse group of friends for a night of frivolity, asking them to donate to ROOM FOR ALL. Once the idea came to me that my birthday party should be a reflection of my life - which is based on giving to others and service to my community - it all fit together flawlessly. Doing some good for the mission of equality within the RCA by generating donations for Room For All made the vain worry of growing old quickly fade away.

Feeling quite confident in this festive plan, I sat down to write some invitations. But as the stack gradually grew, a sharp realization hit me and tears ran down my face. The very thought that I needed to ask for donations to make the

church a welcoming and affirming place gave me such heartfelt pain it was nearly unbearable!

Give to feed the hungry, donate to clothe the poor, contribute to provide medical care or help to secure clean drinking water - all these solicitations seem to proclaim the good works of the church and its willingness to help others. But the fact I needed to ask my friends, who had often been turned out from the church because of their sexual orientation, to give money to make the church a welcoming and affirming place for all was indeed a sad and painful awakening.

I quickly resolved that is was out of this very brokenness that I needed to encourage friends to give; if these hurt and alienated people could offer gifts of healing for the church, then perhaps the church could see this witness of Christ-like compassion and give the same in response.

After the invitations went out I wondered what my friends would think of my choice of charity. Would I be criticized for being a member of a discriminatory church? By show-

ing my love and hope for the church's future, would I be pushing myself to the outside of a group already on the fringe?

My worries were unfounded. The long-awaited birthday arrived and so did many guests with contributions for Room for All. Best of all, some shared their stories of faith and one friend has even returned to worship each Sunday. In being faithful to God and seeking new ways to serve God's people I have indeed received a most wonderful birthday gift.

I encourage everyone to invite your friends to donate to Room for All in lieu of gifts on your next celebratory occasion. After all, who needs a new tie, another shirt, or a pair of socks when instead you could bring people home to God and aid the RCA in becoming the church we are called to be: one that recognizes all of God's children and welcomes them as they are sent to us.


